The Long Range Rifle "Buffalo Guns"

Recent conversations with many of the "Regulators" has focused on long range rifles. We, as a group, seem to have settled into our leverguns and handguns, but there is definite passion developing for the big single shots. Our new ranges offer us many new opportunities for some fast and fancy shootin' but those old "long range" targets seem to offer an unmistakable challenge. It's almost like old Billy Dixon is standing there handing you that big .50 2 ½ inch Sharps and saying "try a shot". When you think of Buffalo hunting the rifle that most think of is the Sharps but the Remington Rolling Block was also commonly used. There seems to be a lot more information on the Sharps and its use on the plains than any of the other rifles. Frank Sellers in his book Sharps goes into detail on the various calibers, and rifle configurations used on the Plains from 1871 to 1884. Generally a Sharps buffalo rifle had a full octagon barrel, weighed over 12 pounds and had double set triggers. Calibers varied during the period but all were over .40. The early period, 1872 to 1875, buffalo were usually shot from 200 to 600 yards and the most popular calibers were the .44/75 2 1/4 inch and the 50/70 Government. Open sites or

globe and peep sights were used and hunting was mostly in Kansas and Nebraska. About one fourth of the rifles were equipped with telescopic sights and weighed as much as 17 ½ pounds. The second period, 1876 to 1878, saw the decline of the .44 and .50 calibers in favor of the .45. Most rifles weighed over 14 pounds and few had telescopic sights. Hunting shifted to Texas. The .44/90 was still popular but the .45 2 7/8 inch and the .45/70 were more frequently ordered from Sharps.In 1879 the Northern herd was being hunted, the .40/90 started to replace the .45 2 7/8 inch for longer range. Ranges were increasing to as far as 900 yards as the herds were becoming wary of hunters. The 45 2/78 inch loaded with a 500 grain bullet over 110 grains of powder provided much better knockdown power than the .40/90 and so it remained more popular with the old buffalo hunters. The buffalo hunters were said to have been the world's best shots on wild game. The last of them died over 50 years ago, the big herds are gone, and it is kind of hard to come by .45/110 or a "Big Fifty" but there are lots of .45/70's available and a couple of dingers on a hillside. Step up Regulator and try a shot
