From the Territorial Governor - Snakebite

Hello Everyone. Here are some of the items that are being discussed at the Regional meetings around the country. I'm sure that some of these will show up on the agenda for this year's Summit.

1. Will consider that a closed lever will not automatically be a penalty if found to be empty when opened. Only the shooter will open it.

2. Some clubs and shooters are NOT following the Dress Code. Discuss ways to enforce the Dress Code, and to get shooters to go beyond the minimal requirements. No awards to shooters who are not in costume.

3. Discuss the rule about retrieving a Dropped round.

4. Update the rule about Single shot Shotguns, to allow them to have ejectors, and require them to have an external hammer.

5. Discussion about the "Straightening Rifle Triggers".

6. Adjust wording to allow Octagonal barrels on Pistols.

7. Establish a minimum size of Rowels on spurs for use in the B Western, and Classic Cowboy categories.

8. There has been a proposal to create sanctioned category "Frontier Cartridge Gunfighter". Hipshot stated that any match that has sufficient participation in that or any other category could and should allow it without making it yet another Sanctioned Category.

9. It was discussed that mail in votes for the Convention NOT be allowed, and that TG's in attendance be allowed to think on their feet as discussions about particular issues evolve.

10. Change rule to allow ONLY the shooter to stage or move their guns.

From the Pokey—

The Line of Fire

The line of fire starts when you put your first gun on the loading table and ends when you pick your last gun up from the unloading table.

What this means is, all requirements and penalties begin and end here.

If you drop a gun at the loading or unloading table, the penalties are the same as if you dropped it during the course of fire.

If you are in line and you have not placed a gun on the loading table and one falls, no call.

There are updates and new rules being discussed by the ROC and it looks like there may be a new Handbook, ROI and/or ROLL manual after the new year.

Download the new books and read the changes. Sign up for an RO refresher course once the new rules do come out, so you can ensure you know what they really mean and how they affect you.

Cowboy Logic—Cowboys

Railroads—The steam railroad was invented in England, but it was perfected in the United States, which stretches 3,000 miles from coast to coast. As tracks were built across the West after the Civil War, railroads became perhaps the most significant factor in the settlement of the frontier.

Construction began on the first transcontinental railroad in 1863. Irish immigrants and Civil War veterans laboring for the Union Pacific Railroad Company laid track westward, while the Central Pacific Railroad Company, relying primarily on Chinese immigrant labor, built eastward from California to meet them. Each company used 10,000 employees, the largest work forces America had ever seen. The federal government provided funding in the form of loans and land allotments for each mile of track laid. The east-west lines met on May 19, 1869, at Promontory Point, Utah, completing what was then regarded as the world's greatest engineering feat.

Federal subsidies soon were extended to three other transcontinentals. The Northern

Pacific, the Southern Pacific, and the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe were completed in the 1880's. A total of 174 million acres of public lands were granted to the railroads. A final transcontinental, the Great Northern, was refused government subsidies, but promoter James J. Hill resourcefully managed to construct the line by 1893. By this time, numerous connecting lines also had been built.

The need to transport freight, livestock and passengers was crucial to the existence of the railroads, so land was aggressively advertised for sale at bargain prices through the East and Europe. Towns flourished beside railroad tracks across the West. Freight transportation invigorated the western economy and passenger traffic was revolutionized throughout the West. But rustlers, bandits and murderers found that escape routes were blocked and posse pursuits were greatly facilitated by the newly created rail lines. The "iron horse" played a major role in the conquest of the West.


